A war veteran's view of Canada's biased family justice system

"When my comrades and I served in the Second World War, to defend democracy and freedom for Great Britain, Canada and all the rest of the free world, we would never have imagined a situation where any of the nations we sought to protect would condone the abuse of children, and the destruction of fatherhood. Regrettably, the Canadian justice system supports the actions of vindictive, angry and selfish mothers to destroy loving fathers by ripping away and forever alienating their children from them."

"My comrades who died in the war, if they were alive today, would be utterly disgusted at how the Canadian government and its system of justice is destroying the families of their descendents today. Not only is it a tragedy for all good fathers, who ultimately are the ones we call to the front line to protect our nations in times of war, but a tragedy for all people who believe in fairness, justice and equality."

"The destruction and devastation of our families by our biased justice system goes against the principles that my comrades and I believed in and defended. We served in the war effort so that the men and women of all nations could enjoy freedom, democracy, equality and justice. Unfortunately, it seems that in Canada, in spite of the democracy and freedom that it claims to have, justice and equality between men and women and the importance of fatherhood have been ignored by a system that seems to consider fathers as disposable commodities of little value in their children's lives."

Mr. Conway is an ex-serviceman of the British Royal Marines who was on active duty during World War II. He was awarded a citation from the Lord Mayor of London for his valiant efforts during the bombing of London. He has been a resident of Canada since 1955.

He has been unable to see his Canadian born daughter as a result of the biased Canadian justice system (Ruling made by Judge Lynn King of the Ontario Court, Provincial Division) and the actions of a vindictive and hostile immigrant woman who abused Mr. Conway and Canada's lax welfare and immigration policies in order to gain resident status in Canada. At the time of writing 50% of Mr. Conway's pension and old age funds are garnisheed from him by court order and given to the immigrant mother who refuses to allow him to see his daughter. Mr. Conway, a once proud soldier fighting for justice and freedom has been treated unjustly by Canada's legal system and is a forgotten victim of Canada's anti-father and anti-family court policies. He has now been forced by the courts to live in poverty.
